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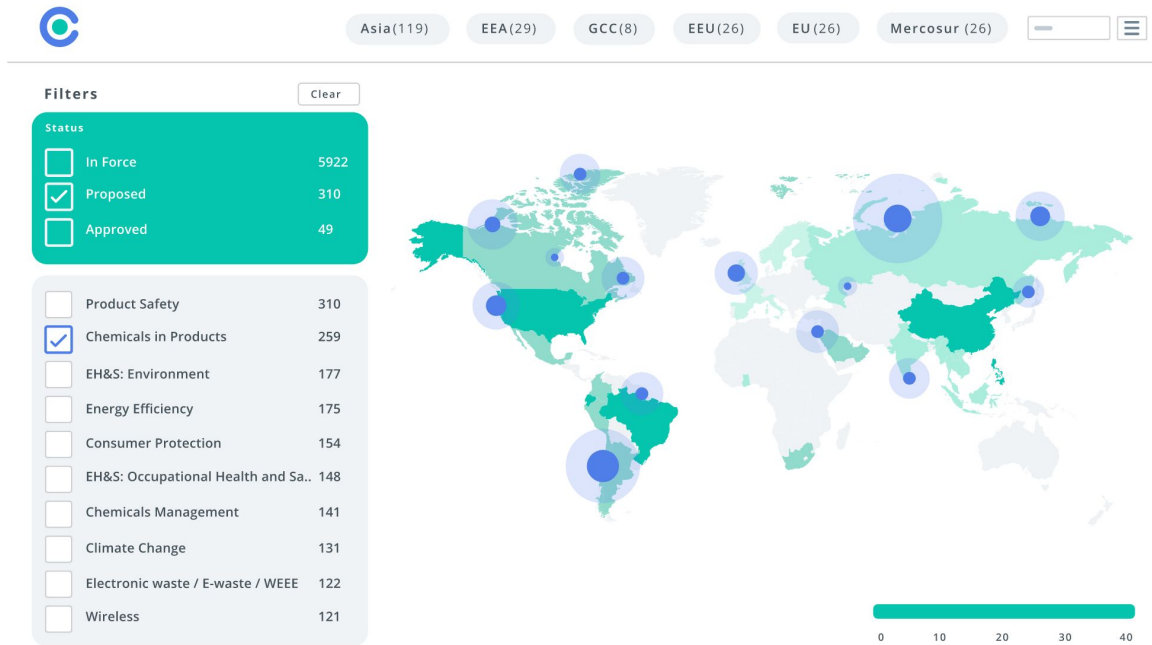

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## 03. Introduction

**The use of PFAS in consumer products has become an important topic in recent years as many states/countries try to limit or prohibit their use due to their harmful effects on health and the environment.**

Traditionally, PFAS have been used in a variety of products due to their powerful ability to repel oil and water and resist heat. PFAS include more than 10,000 man-made substances, all of which have tight chemical bonds between their carbon and fluorine atoms. It is this extremely tight bond that gives them their useful properties of water and heat resistance. However, it is also this impenetrable nature that leads to their persistent presence in the environment and in human bodies.

Currently, 15 states have enacted legislation related to PFAS in products, many of these states have also proposed additional legislation related to PFAS. To add to that list, six more states have proposed legislation awaiting further action in their respective legislatures. The enacted and proposed legislation covers a variety of products including cookware, apparel, outdoor apparel for severe conditions, children's products, upholstered products, carpets/rugs, as well as personal care products and cosmetics. Much of the legislation also addresses PFAS in all consumer products.

For manufacturers, retailers, importers and distributors, the variety of obligations across the states definitely creates some challenges. Not only do the scope of covered products vary, but so do the scope of requirements.

This comparison chart provides an overview of the key US state PFAS legislative activity for various consumer products, clearly outlining where legislation has been enacted, proposed, or remains absent, and detailing the scope of covered products, as well as an overview of obligations.
